Ramstein High School's Mission Statement: Our mission is to provide a varied and challenging curriculum that will allow students to be life-long learners and responsible participants in a global community. Continuous School Improvement (CSI) Goals: All students will increase critical thinking skills in all curricular areas, improving performance in higher order thinking skills (application, analysis, synthesis, evaluation), interpreting graphic information, comparing and contrasting, problem solving, and recognizing patterns. All students will increase written communication skills in all curricular areas, improving performance in precision, clarity, word choice, and sentence structure.

Ramstein High School (RHS) is the largest Department of Defense high school world-wide. It is located on Ramstein Air Base in Germany and provides an American education for school-aged children living overseas. The military/school community consists of Air Force, Army, Navy, and Civilian personnel.

RHS opened in 1982 and is fully accredited by the North Central Association Commission on Accreditation and School Inarrovement. It is a four-year school with an enrollment of 1.012 students and a senior class of 205. The faculty and staff include 3 Administrators, 5 Guidance Counselors, 2 Information Specialista, 66 Classroom Teachers, 1 Nurse, 1 Psychologist, 2 Adolescent Substance Abuse Counseling Services providers, 6.5 Special Needs Teachers, and 2.0 Educational Technologists. Curriculum

RHS offnes a comprohensive and diverse educational program of challenging academic opportunities. It also includes a Carour Technical Education program, which provides skill endorsement in a variety of fields, and, durough career practicism, an abundance of apprentice-type opportunities. Honors combination classes in World Literature/World History are offered in 9th and 10th Grades. These courses are not weighted for GPA purposes. Advanced Placement courses include: Chemistry, Physics, Psychology, Calculus A-B, Calculus B-C. Storigtics, German Language, French Language, Spanish Language, English Language and Composition, English Liz, and Composition, American Government, American History, World History, European History and Environmental Science. Virtual School courses are also offered.

Grading System

Grade reports are given quarterly. However, only semester grades appear on the students' transcripts and permanent records. Grade point avariaties are based on a finar-point scale: A=4.00; B=3.00; C=2.00; D=1.00; F=0.00; Only Advanced Placement courses are weighted and cam in additional grade point except for a grade of F. Grade point averages include weighted grades. All courses are included in the The Ramstein High School code (CEEB) is 576340.

Class Rank

The Department of Defense Dependent Schools' grading system is A=100-90%; B=89-80%; C=79-70%; D=69-60% By DoDEA regulations, cumulative class ranks are based on semester grades in all subjects and are computed for senior students at the end of the eighth semester. Class rank is reported as a cumulative average which ranks the students numerically as follows: 1, 2, 3, 4, etc., out of the number of seniors. The only weighted grades are AP grades.

Academic Recognition

RHS students obtained the following composite mean scores: 2010 SAT - Critical Reading 551, Writing 532. and Math 525.

The RHS class of 2010 had approximately 75% choose to attend 4 year colleges in 26+ states throughout the US, as well as, in many countries around the world (Australia, Germany, Denmark and England). We have around 7 % attending community and technical colleges, and 10% who joined the military after high school.

Almost all of our graduating students received scholarship money (approximately 3 million+ total) in 2010, many with ROTC scholarships.

Obtaining a letter of recommendation



- 1. Always ask in person and ask politely. Do not email your request for a letter of recommendation. You are asking another person to give his/her time to help you, so do so in person.
- 2. When using any online web sites, such as the Common Application, be sure to ask ahead of time, before any emails from colleges just show up unannounced in your teacher's mailbox.
- 3. Clearly state your needs and tell exactly what kind of letter you need. Be sure to give your teacher a deadline.
- 4. Give your evaluator at least two weeks to accomplish his/her task. If you ever need a letter in less than this amount of time be sure you realize you are making an extraordinary request.
- 5. If your college or job demands a printed form, give all your forms at once to your evaluator. Be sure to keep a copy of all letters and forms if your evaluator will allow it. This is for your own benefit in case something gets lost in the mail.
- 6. Be sure you provide your evaluator a "brag sheet" or resume telling what you have accomplished during your high school years. Include activities such as scouting, church involvement, etc. that take place outside the school. List honors/AP classes taken and AP exam scores if you earned a 3 or better. You may also wish to include your SAT and ACT scores.
- 7. Be sure to thank your evaluator. A written thank-you note is the minimum required. If your evaluator wrote more than two letters or did an especially good job, a small gift is appropriate; think home made cookies or a small bouquet of flowers.
- 8. Keep in mind you may one day need a letter of recommendation from a specific teacher. Treat all your teachers with respect and be sure to build a good relationship with at least a couple of them. Don't forget, English teachers write the best and anyone wanting a service academy appointment or an ROTC scholarship will need a strong recommendation from a science or math teacher.

Some Rules to Consider when Selecting a College or University

- Try not to make your final college selection without visiting at least your top two or three choices. No matter how well you think you know a college or university, you can learn a lot (good or bad) by spending a few hours on campus, including whether or not the college feels like a good "fit" for you. Having family members accompany you on college visits is a great idea because it gives you extra "eyes and ears" and people with whom you can discuss your impressions.
- A college is not necessarily right for you because its name is familiar. That might seem pretty obvious, but you wouldn't believe how many students equate educational quality with name recognition.
- 3. Investigate at least three or four colleges you know little or nothing about but offer the field(s) of study of interest to you, are appropriately selective for a students with your grades and SAT or ACT scores, and are located in geographic areas attractive to you. You have nothing to lose and you might make a great discovery. A little research and an open mind can greatly increase the odds that you make a good college choice.
- 4. There are very few worse reasons to select a college than because your friends are going there. Choosing a college because your girlfriend or boyfriend is headed there is one of them. In fact, if there is a worse reason to choose a college, it escapes us.
- Investigate, investigate, investigate, and be sure to separate reality from (often baseless) opinions. Lots of folks will refer to a college as "good", "hard to get into", "a party school", "too expensive", etc. without really knowing the facts. Don't accept these kinds of generalizations without evidence.
- 6. Do not rule out colleges early because of cost. Many colleges offer scholarships, financial aid, and tuition installment plans that make them far more affordable than they may first appear. You can't/won't know how much it will cost to attend a college until the very end of the process.
- Deadlines, whether for college applications, SAT or ACT registration, financial aid, scholarships, campus housing, etc. are not suggestions. Write down on a calendar and adhere strictly to all deadlines.
- 8. Don't be afraid to apply to a few "reach schools". You might be pleasantly surprised by the results if you are not entirely unrealistic. Then, apply to at least three colleges you like which are highly likely to admit you. Finally, choose at least two "safety" colleges. Colleges to which you are virtually certain you will be admitted. Choosing "safety" schools they don't really like is a mistake many students make. If you take the time to choose safety schools you would be happy to attend, you'll eliminate all the anxiety some students experience in the college application and admissions process.
- 9. When it is time to make your final choice, discuss your options with your family, your counselor (if you have one), and others who know you well and whose judgment you value. If you have a tough time choosing among two or more colleges or universities it is probably because you have done a good job putting together your list and you will be happy at whichever institution you choose. Once you make your choice, don't agonize over it. If you have followed these rules there is an excellent chance your final college choice will be a good one.



Homework Zone: Students are welcome to attend the RHS Homework Zone from 7:15 – 8:00 and 3:15-4:45, Monday through Thursday. This is a great opportunity for students in need of extra support and a quiet study environment. Students will be expected to sign in and out and do not need to stay for the entire time.

Online Tutoring: All families that are affiliated with the military have access to a website that offers free online live tutoring, 24 hours a day, 7 days a week: <u>http://www.tutor.com/military</u>.

Seminar: Every other day, Students have a "Seminar" period scheduled. This is an 85 minute class period where students are able to visit their teachers, ask questions about their work, and participate in quiet study time. Some Students use this time to make up tests or to catch up on work they may have missed due to absences.

Peer Tutoring: During Seminar, Students may request to have a pass to go to the National Honor Society Seminar, run by Ms. Slusny (room D23). They can receive tutoring from one of their peers who is in the National Honor Society and has maintained a 3.8 GPA.
